

Is this a first – "wild" Peafowl in Northumberland – and where has it come from? Maybe next spring they will have a brood and by then I might be lucky and get a photograph.

A message from Revd John Carr, Cornhill with Carham & Branxton

The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world and those who live in it. (Psalm 24:1)

As spring moves to summer I'm reminded of that verse from the Psalms, a recognition of God's creation and creativity. Scots Pines at Branxton and Crookham



There are six Scots pine trees (*Pinus sylvestris*) framing the southern entrance to Branxton village. There are also two isolated Scots pines below the entrance to Crookham village in the vicinity of Sandyford Farm and there is a distinctive line of trees standing against the skyline as seen from the road from Heatherslaw. The rugged and attractive Scots pine is native to the cool climate of northern Europe. It is an evergreen tree that can reach a height of 40 to 50 feet with a spread of 30 feet. It has a lifespan of 250-300 years or more and is able to thrive in poor soils. The needles are blue-green in summer sometimes changing colour in winter to yellow-green and the bark is orange and peels away from the trunk to give an attractive pattern. The resinous timber was much used for masts, spars and planking in the days of wooden sailing ships. The tree was voted national tree of Scotland in 2014 (The Woodland Trust) being particularly associated with the remnants of the once extensive Caledonian forest.

Why are they there? It is said that the Druids lit large bonfires of Scots pine at the winter solstice to encourage the return of the sun and the fertilisation of the land;

they also decorated pine glades with bright objects to symbolise divine light and eternal life. Folklore suggests that Scots pines were used to mark trackways, drove roads and crossroads and perhaps burial cairns or perimeters of meadows or villages where drovers and their herds could stay the night. Another suggestion is that they were planted in England by Jacobite sympathisers. The Branxton and Crookham trees may not be old enough to fall into any of these categories but they could be older than they look, if growing in poor soil. They might also have been planted to replace older trees that fulfilled one or more of the functions mentioned above. Local residents may have the answers.
